

CHORD'S COVID RELIEF EFFORT

Relief Mission for the Slum dwellers (Migrantlaborers and Daily wagers)

Covid, declared a pandemic by WHO, has brought in its wake untold misery into the lives of vulnerable people at the margins of our society. Covid-19, a dreadfully infectious virus, forced majority of the nations to declare lock-downs to save the lives of their inhabitants. The Covid-19 Lockdown resulted in incalculable economic damage in India and rendered many hungry and helpless. According to ILO (Economic Times), an estimated 400 million people will lose their jobs and livelihood in India. Although the Lock-down has virtually hit every soul under the sun, the worst affected are the poor migrant laborers and daily wagers at the grassroots.

In times of natural calamities CHORD went to the rescue of the helpless victims with a team of trained work force that worked round the clock to bring succor, relief, and comfort to the unfortunate victims. CHORD Emergency Relief team swung into action within two weeks after the Lock-down, surveying and assessing the needs of over 50 slums which are serviced under our social initiative umbrella, and initiated the distribution of **Dry ration kits and Care kits to over 16000 families** since April'2020 with the merge resources at our disposal, as well as through crowd sourcing.

Project Plan of Action:

During the course of our relief mission, we have realized that the Pandemic Covid-19 is here to stay with us for an indefinite period until a vaccine or treatment is invented, and will continue to devastate the lives of the poor and the marginalized. Hence, the migrant laborers desperately need food and care kits support for at least four months until they find jobs and normalcy is restored to the economy. Our first priority will always be the target groups we are currently serving. Accordingly, we have chosen migrant families residing in slums in our target area. The idea is to reach out with requirement of dry ration kits to sustain their families and also to help them to ward off the deadly disease by promoting awareness about washing hands and wearing masks.

Meals Distribution

CHORD also proudly announced Give-Suremeal distribution plan for Covid-19 hit migrants and unemployed people at the grassroots. CHORD, in Collaboration with 'REBEL FOODS', world's largest internet (https://rebelfoods.com/) restaurant company, launched in right earnest, Give-Sure, a meal distribution program meant for Covid-19 hit migrant laborers and the unemployed in the neighborhood slums of Hyderabad. This program targeted distributing 12600 meals to those rendered hungry and unemployed by the Covid-19 induced Lockdown. Against this target we have distributed over 15000 meals in several corners of Hyderabad. This initiative will continue until October 2021 based on the needs on the ground.

Bridge or Remedial School

BRIDGE / REMEDIAL SCHOOLS FOR ELIMINATION OF CHILD LABOUR

- Provides intensive education with the aim of preparing school dropouts or working children to be integrated into mainstream schools.
- · Is an intermediary form of education that bridges the gap between non-formal and formal education.
- Is a community-based school that employs intensive curricula, nutrition, and health care facilities with the aim of helping former child labourers or school dropouts to catch up or make up for the years outside school.

Since its inception, CHORD has employed Remedial Schooling as a potent strategy for rescuing, educating, and reintegrating over 16300 children into the formal education system.

REMEDIAL SCHOOLING

India still has a significantly high number of children employed as child laborers (over 10.1 million according to UNICEF). According to government statistics, 10-15% of India's children are still out of school.

Remedial schools are CHORD's initiative to provide holistic and flexible educational opportunities to those children who have been victims of child labor, have dropped out of school, or have never been enrolled in a school. We undertake the responsibility of providing free education to children between the ages of 7& 14 with a specially designed curriculum that adheres neither to formal nor an informal model, yet caters to the learning capabilities of these children having poor educational exposure or retention capacity.

We particularly keep in mind that a child takes about 12- 24 months to regain lost Education and learning momentum. We strive to empower the students by making up for lost education and rebuilding a learning foundation, integrating the child into mainstream education, and enabling the child toward a sturdy development plan through guidance and care.

Girl power to the fore ...

Girl's education - a lifeline to development:

Education is one of the most critical areas of empowerment for women. It is also an area that offers some of the clearest examples of discrimination that women face. Among children not attending school, there are twice as many girls as boys, and among illiterate adults, there are twice as many women as men.

Offering girls basic education is a sure way of giving them much greater power — of enabling them to make genuine choices over the kinds of lives they wish to lead. This is not a luxury. The Convention on the Rights of the Child and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women establish it as a basic human right-UNICEF

We at CHORD promote Girl's Education because we believe that:

- "Educated Women might have the chance of a healthier and happier life"- Should be strong enough reason.
- An educated woman has the skills, information, and self-confidence that she needs to be a better parent, worker, and citizen.
- An educated woman will also be more productive at work.
- The dividend for educational investment is often higher for women than men.

CHORD believes that education, particularly of the girl child, has always been a highly effective tool for social change, that includes family planning, subscription to better health care and hygiene for children, and equalizing the male to female ratio in employment in all sectors. CHORD strives to protect these young girls and provides them with neighborhood schooling programs as per our development model, which propels the child toward academic and intrinsic progress through Formal/Vocational education. We believe that, support during adolescent ages creates a lasting effect on the lives of the girls, further empowering them to be independent and responsible women who will grow up to lead change in their families and communities.

AASHIRWAD School for Girl Children

Project Overview & Scope: CHORD strives to rescue, educate, and mainstream I 20 working girl children (Migrated Urban Child Laborers) every year through their bridge school project in Ranga Reddy District, Telangana, India. The challenge is to break the cyclic life pattern of working children through the innovative remedial school education program developed by the organization. The program not only provides a holistic and flexible learning opportunity to children, but also lays emphasis on supporting them in their early adulthood stage. The objective is to rebuild a strong learning foundation, which has been denied to them, so that they can be integrated into mainstream education. Aashirwad School for girl children which is in its eighth year of implementation, is a social intervention jointly initiated by CHORD and Qualcomm and it aims to educate, empower, enrich, and enliven the lives of girl children. This endeavor would help them acquire primary, secondary, and higher education, provide them with vocational training and prepare them for a bright successful future.



Providing Quality Formal School Education to children mainstreamed from remedial schools is one of the key Social Interventions successfully pioneered by CHORD since 2006.CHORD Aashirwad English Medium School at Bachupally was the first of its kind, pioneering access to Quality Mainstream/Formal education for deprived urban children and rescued child laborers. Since its start in 2006, the school has successfully mainstreamed through formal education, over 2500 underprivileged children and has not only imparted top quality education, but also helped them develop a good all round personality and the spirit of volunteerism through extracurricular activities and community service initiatives. The project has been supported by Optum Global Solutions (India) Pvt. Ltd. FY 2021-22.



The challenge is to retain and educate children mainstreamed from remedial Schools in the Formal educational environment, (Aashirwad EM School) to arrest dropout rates and to provide continuity and dignity to their academic quest with the aim of facilitating a livelihood opportunity.

The Program ensures the following imperatives.

- Support Education, shelter (for residential children) and Health Care Needs of 330 urban deprived children with a thrust on providing quality education as well as a dignified learning environment.
- Each child receives age-appropriate Quality School Education followed by Vocational training that enables them to realize their dreams and to become dignified livelihood earners of a new India
- STEM education promoted for underprivileged Children.


For Urban Deprived Children

5. Skill Development Program

Fostering Grassroots Regeneration

SKILL BHARATH

Fostering Grassroots Regeneration

Skill Bharath Program is an initiative formulated to reduce the cases of unemployment among the educated and uneducated youth due to the lack of employable skills. We identify and enroll vulnerable youth and offer professional training by experts in their particular fields so that the beneficiaries may be eligible for employment or be empowered to start an entrepreneurial venture based on their skills. **Accenture** and **Nasscom Foundation** have been supporting this program.

Objectives

- Developing job worthiness among unemployed youth
- Creating free access to employable skill training in job oriented courses.
- Ensuring long term employment for vulnerable youth through skill-based training and counseling.
- Providing Skill centers as a potential employment opportunity.
- Creating awareness about the relevance of skill training in the current job environment.

Mission

Enabling 7700 participants toward a self-reliant livelihood in 5 years

Track record

- In the last THIRTEEN years over 6300 young men and women were trained and employed in our 12 training centers
- Skill Bharat program successfully trained 400 beneficiaries in 2021-22 and enabled them towards a self-reliant and independent livelihood opportunities

GROWTH GENE PROJECT

Social Transformation in the Age of Acceleration

The Growth Gene Project as a community development initiative of CHORD was launched in 2015 with an initial three-year support from Microsoft IT, Hyderabad, with following objectives:

- To bring intrinsic growth and development in the Yellamabanda slum, one of Hyderabad's largest urban slums, over three years, through a multi-pronged approach with three collaterals- education, training and awareness building (Schooling-Skilling-Sensitizing).
- To create an elemental change from within the community and developing a chain of beneficiaries who in turn help build the
 outcome of the project.
- To change the intrinsic nature, the cyclic pattern of family poverty and children being forced into labor, by widening the
 periphery of gain and transforming the very factor that triggers poverty and a labor relapse in children i.e. Parents and
 Community.

By the year 2020, the project had met all the deliverables and had achieved the following remarkable and measurable social impact.

SOCIAL IMPACT OF GROWTH GENE

- The project has supported the economic development of vulnerable women by breaking the vicious cyclical poverty trap.
- The skill training for women has provided self-employment for some at their homes, giving them a daily income and enabled them to buy necessary medicines and make them capable to pay school fees for their growing children.
- The income of the women has enhanced their independence. They are no more dependent on anyone else.
- GGP has established an empirically tested Social enterprise model providing employment to 50 women enabling them to earn a regular income.
- The economic development of women and the sensitization efforts of the project has motivated them to participate in the decision-making process. They are able to teach these learned skills to other vulnerable women who are needy.
- · Children have been provided quality remedial education and have been mainstreamed into the formal school system

Having achieved its pre-set goals, the project now aims to scale its operations with the following road map in mind

WAY FORWARD FOR GGP

- · Four solid reasons based on our empirical experience, point towards the expansion of the program through replication
- The pilot program has turned out to be a huge success.
- Groundbreaking results achieved in establishing a sustainable and scalable social enterprise through social innovation.
- Social enterprise has attained brand visibility and is poised to achieve economic break-even point, promising a bright future for the project.
- GGP proves beyond doubt that quality education and training are the key drivers of economic growth and social inclusion as
 well as a critical enabler for achieving gender equality.

SWECHA PROJECT

(Skill for Women Education for Children Through Holistic Approach)

SWECHA is the brainchild of CHORD and UBS Business Solutions India Pvt.Ltd. with the following objectives:

Child-centric developmental intervention deploying education, training, and awareness building to transform the lives of the Yellammabanda slum dwellers by rooting out ignorance and family poverty, with the aim of ushering in elemental change that brings about livelihood opportunity and prosperity to the targeted community.

- 1. Provision of employable skill training in Tailoring for women, (100 women/year)
- 2. Rescue, rehabilitation and education of child laborers (70 children/year)
- 3. Sensitization and awareness building through community awareness programs in 21 slums

CHILD RIGHTS ADVOCACY ENLIGHTENING (SENSITIZING) THE COMMUNITY

Problem Description: Sensitization of community on the issues of child rights and gender equality is one of the key components of the CHORD mission. A concerted effort from all stakeholders in propagating the issue to break the silence and to galvanize public opinion is of paramount importance in this whole exercise. It is about bringing a shift in the consciousness of the people and urging them to do what is right but not what is easy and what has been a flawed convention. It is about bringing about a change in attitude for good. It is about looking at the situation differently and changing one's perspective towards women and children and looking upon them as key pillars of our society

Approach and Methodology of the Program:

CHORD is the Resource Cell and focal point for key activities relating to advocacy and sensitization of key partners at the Mandal level and colony-level network offices and for the training of remedial school staff and administration on sensitization. It will add value to the project in the following ways:

- Facilitating dialogue and exchange of experiences amongst the CHORD Project units.
- Mainstreaming issues relating to child labour and education into all training programmes such as the leadership development programme, joint educational programme, personality development programme, etc.
- Conducting sensitization programmes for parents of child labourers on issues relating to child labour and CHILD rights issues.
- · Conducting sensitization programmes for teachers of local government and private schools.
- Training of CHORD staff on Project implementation, accounts and administrative matters.
- · Gender issues and dialogue on Gender equality and inclusion among the stakeholders
- Dissemination of CHORD success stories.

English language training for the Non-elite (Disadvantaged Children)

Access is a communicative English language training program where children between the ages of 13-20, from non-elite backgrounds, are given the opportunity for comprehensive study of the English language. The Program also focuses on personality development, besides imparting communicative English

This is done by dividing the students into two groups of 25 each and conducting after school sessions for them thrice a week.

This program is funded by the US. Government and supervised by the Regional English Language Office of the U.S. Embassy and by the Public Affairs Section of the U.S. Consulate General Hyderabad.

So far CHORD has trained 225 Children under this program in two sessions from 2012-2016 CHORD has been awarded yet another ACCESS Program FY 2020-2022 by the US Department of state (American Embassy) which was launched in October 2020.

M. Shyamala and her husband worked as daily wage workers to run their households. All they did every day was leave their children at home and risk their lives to put food on the table. Despite the tough circumstances they wanted to start a business as their work was not paying them enough to pay the rent and take care of their children. M. 

Fathima says her husband usually finds it very difficult to find a job as he works in construction. The couple say they have also borrowed money countless times from their landlord and employer which has only made matters worse over time. But she says "I luckily found out about CHORD's Skill Bharath program and I never looked back. The program is one of the best decisions I have ever taken. The training period was good, I could learn a lot of stitching techniques from the trainers. After the completion of my training, I was even awarded a certificate from NCVTE and a sewing machine was also given to me by the management. Now, I am working from my home, taking care of my children, and making around Rs. 10,000/- per month. I can never thank CHORD enough, the organizations saved our lives and made us stand strong on our feet. I feel lucky and blessed to have the support of CHORD, thank you so much is all I can say."
